

From Ben's Pen

Prayer is important in our spiritual journey and in a world that is having to deal with a raging coronavirus pandemic. In Ken Gire's book, *Between Heaven and Earth*, he asks the question, “Who prays.” He then goes on to answer his own question, “In a word everybody. Or almost everybody. People who pray come from all walks of life. From the very young to the very old. From teenagers to parents of teenagers. From monks to married couples. From Jews to Christians. From Catholics to Protestants. Popes to prostitutes. American Indians to agnostics. Yes, agnostics. Even atheists. Surveys indicate that nearly one in five of them prays daily. Hedging their bets, maybe. Or perhaps they are drawn to prayer by a tidal pull on the ragged shores of their soul, a pull so irresistible it overcomes even the seawalls of their own unbelief.

The more appropriate question, maybe, is not who prays...but who doesn't? Since the dawn of time people have prayed for all kinds of reasons and to all kinds of deities. They have prayed to Amon Ra, the Egyptian sun God, and to the pantheon of petty and capricious gods of the Greeks and Romans. Some have prayed to the earth; others to the sky. Some have prayed to Baal, the Canaanite deity; others to Yahweh, the God of the Old Testament. Some have prayed to Allah; others to Jesus. Some have prayed to a “higher power”; others to patron saints. Some to angels; others to Mary, mother of God.

And though the object of their prayers differs, sometimes dramatically, the subject of their prayers doesn't. Not substantially, anyway. Regardless of their faith, or lack of it, all people seem to realize the tenuousness of their humanity and their dependence on someone or something greater than themselves. Who of us, however faithful or faithless, doesn't pray in a moment when the lump on the breast turns out to be malignant? Or in another moment when an officer calls to report an accident in which a loved one has been critically injured? Who doesn't pray at the birth of a child? Or the death of a parent? Or at the wedding of a daughter? Who of us doesn't pray when a radio bulletin tells a nation its president has been shot or when a television broadcast tells a community that one of its children has been kidnapped? Who of us doesn't pray when the young men and women of our country are sent into battle? Or when a baby has a temperature of 106?”

One of our deepest questions is whether prayer makes a difference. Many years ago in a small, poverty stricken house in London, there lived a hard working woman. Her back was bent from years of standing day after day over a washtub, this being her only source of income. As she worked, she constantly prayed for her son who was later to run away to sea while only a teenager. She believed that God answers prayer and with this faith she never gave up hope that her son would one day give his life in service to God. After she died, her son, by then a slave trader, became the “sailor preacher” of London. John Newton brought thousands of people to Christ. His hymn “Amazing Grace,” which has been sung by people all over the

world, is today as meaningful as when he sat down and wrote the words --- words which were his testimony of the grace and forgiveness of God.

John Newton's words reached a skeptical man of great learning named Thomas Scott, who had said that he did not need a Savior. Later Scott's writings led many people to be followers of Jesus Christ, including William Cowper. Cowper's poetry and prose in turn touched many people lives, one being William Wilburforce, the British statesman who went on to work so vigorously for the abolition of slavery. The chain of influence goes on as people read and are inspired by the words of these men. Little did John Newton's mother dream that the prayers for her son would be used by God to go on and on touching so many lives.

So, yes your prayers do make a difference. Pray for those you love. Pray for Forestburg. Pray for our country and planet. Pray for peace on earth, and for health and healing in the homes of humankind. Pray for those who are working to reign in the coronavirus. You never know what difference your prayers will make!

They will reside in our parsonage and will be very active in every aspect of our church and community life. Reverend Parr is a Local Licensed Pastor. He will be serving in a Full-Time capacity. He is excited to be coming to Forestburg, stating that this opportunity to minister to us is "a dream come true for him." The following is his biographical information.

"Reverend Greg Parr felt the call to ministry in 2004 when he began hosting a Sunday night worship service in his hometown church of Nocona, Texas. At that time he attended classes and became a lay speaker for the church and even taught courses for the District. He was then encouraged to begin the journey towards full-time ministry by starting the candidacy process for local licensed ministers in 2011. In December of 2011, he began serving Vashti UMC as the youth leader. He completed licensing school in May of 2013, and has served as Senior Pastor to both Bellevue and Vashti United Methodist Churches since July of 2013.

Greg is a native of Nocona, Texas. He holds degrees from Cooke County College and DeVry University. He is currently working in the Course of Study through Perkins and attends classes at the North Texas Conference Center in Plano, Texas.

Greg serves with passion for the people of his congregations and desires relationships with them. He strives to support, love and guide those that are entrusted to his care.

Greg was baptized at the age of 13 at the Nocona FUMC by Merwin Turner, who had a very influential role in his life. Our First Sunday to Worship in the Sanctuary—June 14!

But for this to happen, as suggested by, Bishop McKee, Rev. Cammy Gaston, Director for the Center for Leadership Development, and our District Superintendent, Rev. Todd Harris, guidelines are to be in place to ensure that every precautionary step will be taken to keep our church members here at Forestburg UMC healthy and safe.

The following guidelines have been approved and adopted for Forestburg UMC. Please read carefully.

A Plan for the Reopening of Forestburg United Methodist Church

We know that the virus that causes COVID-19 can be spread to others by infected persons who have few or no symptoms. Even if an infected person is only mildly ill, the people they spread it to may become seriously ill or even die, especially if that person is 65 or older with pre-existing health conditions that place them at higher risk. Because of the hidden nature of this threat we will follow the following guidelines as we reopen Forestburg United Methodist Church.

1. We will encourage our at risk congregation (those 65 years or older, especially those with chronic lung disease, moderate to severe asthma, chronic heart disease, severe obesity, diabetes, chronic kidney disease undergoing dialysis, liver disease, or weakened immune system) to stay at home.
2. We will seat persons in every other pew and use painters tape to designate six feet of spacing between attendees. Two or more members of the same household can sit adjacent to each other with six feet of separation on either side. We may need to set up chairs in the fellowship hall.
3. We will encourage every worshipper to wear a mask and will have masks available. The pastor will wear a mask.
4. We will not sing and will read the words of the hymns from the overhead monitors.
5. There will be hand sanitizing stations at the entrance to the sanctuary.
6. Instead of bulletins we will have the order announced by the pastor and utilize our overhead monitors.
7. Offering plates will be placed at either end of the chancel rail and will not be passed. The congregation will be invited to walk up and place their gifts in the collection plates observing social distancing.
8. Initially, we will not have communion.
9. We will not serve food and coffee or have indoor fellowship.
10. Those who volunteer to clean the building shall wear a mask and rubber gloves which are to be disposed of following cleaning. Prior to leaving the building we will wipe all door knobs, and the bathroom and kitchen counter tops.
11. We will not encourage shaking hands or hugging each other. We will observe social distancing.
12. At this time there will be no Sunday School.
13. We will not have special musicians and soloists during the month of June.
14. If someone who has attended a weekly service is diagnosed with the coronavirus the next week following worship, the church will self-quarantine for 14 days.
15. At this time there will be no children's programming or activities.
16. Weddings and funerals will observe social distancing.
17. We will continue to have members of the Administrative Council call assigned church members each week.
18. We will enter the building from the North and South side sanctuary doors and exit through the kitchen on the North side and the South side exit door by the nursery and restrooms.
19. We will meet every other Sunday through June starting June 14. We learned that the COVID-19 virus lives on objects for 9 days. Having volunteers clean the building, it was felt that the safest schedule to worship was to meet every 14 days or every other week which would eliminate the threat of a lingering COVID-19 virus.
